Fabric list:

Background fabric—good quality unbleached muslin or cream prints; can be all one fabric or scrappy; a total of **3 ½ yards**

Schoolhouses—my houses are all made from a collected stash of Turkey Red fabrics; they could also be made from one fabric; total of **2 ½ yards**

Vines and Leaves—mine are all of solid fabrics (different shades of Turkey Red); could be scrappy—a total of **2 yards**

Binding—your choice; **½ yard**

Backing and Hanging Sleeve—your choice; **4 yards**

Workshop supplies:

<p align="center">Machine piecing w/Bonnie February 11 & 25, 9 am to 4 pm each day</p>	<p align="center">Hand appliqué w/Dana March 11 & 25, 9 am to 4 pm each day</p>
<p><i>In these two workshops you will learn to make 3 different schoolhouse blocks and how to machine piece tricky set-in seams and sew blocks with tiny pieces. There may be some homework following the first session if you want to complete your quilt top at the second class when we'll assemble all of the blocks, add borders, and start embroidering names of teachers and/or school chums. (Embroidery is optional.)</i></p> <p>Fabric—<i>no home prep except to pre-wash</i> Sewing machine, foot pedal, extension cord Schoolhouse Memories[©] pattern <i>(available at workshop for \$5)</i></p> <p>Extra bobbins, machine needles Thread, scissors, seam ripper, pins Rotary cutter, mat board & ruler Embroidery floss—<i>your choice of color</i> 8"-10" embroidery hoop Embroidery needle Fabric marking tool for embroidery; <i>I like to use blue water-soluble pens but pencils work well, too</i> Small trash bag for scraps Lunch</p>	<p>Basic sewing supplies <i>(including a sharp pair of scissors—small ones are preferable—able to cut neatly right to the point of the scissor)</i></p> <p>Machine with zigzag capabilities Freezer paper Fusible web (<i>Wonder Under, etc.</i>) 5" or 6" square <i>should be adequate</i></p> <p>Rotary cutter and mat Threads to match Thimble</p> <p>Dana will provide students with her favorite hand-appliqué needle.</p>
